

With the final word devoured, I can guarantee readers will yearn for another page.



This book is a must-read for those seeking a deeper understanding of the inequalities present within society.



GULL ISLAND



"Gull Island" is about surviving and finding a way to get back up regardless of how daunting the journey in front of us appears to be and what creatures lurk in the dark.




